- >> Visit **nyseg.com** and go paper-free with our free **e**-Bill service save stamps, checks and paper. With this free service, you can receive and pay your bill online and view up to 13 months of billing history.
- >> Use our e-Payment service to make an electronic payment from your checking account. You can pay online at **nyseg.com** and still receive a paper bill by mail or by calling our Self Service Line at **1.800.600.2275** – no enrollment or login needed.

Other payment options:

- >> Enroll in our **electronic funds transfer** (EFT) service, still receive a paper bill but have your payment automatically deducted from your checking account 23 days after we mail your bill. We will no longer include a return envelope with your bill and you'll save a paper check and stamp each month. You can combine EFT with our **e**-Bill service – view your bill online with the security of knowing your payment will be automatically made. To enroll, complete the form on the back of your bill payment stub or visit nyseg.com.
- >> Mail your payment to us using the envelope we supply with your bill statement.
- >> Drop your payment off at one of our offices.
- >> Pay at one of our pay agents (grocery stores or other local businesses) or pay your NYSEG bill by credit card online. (Note: A \$1 to \$5.95 convenience fee will be added by the pay agent to the total amount for either of these services).

Stay Safe When Working Outdoors



Know what's **below. Call before you dig.**

Whether you're a contractor or a homeowner doing an outdoor project, having underground utilities marked is essential to protect yourself from injury and prevent damage to underground utility lines.

Having underground utilities marked is easy — simply call **811** at least two working days (not including the day you call) but not more than 10 working days before you plan to start your project. (If you choose, you can call Dig Safely New York directly at **1.800.962.7962**.)



Look Up...Look Out!

When working outside, remember to watch overhead. Aluminum siding, gutters, ladders and other materials can conduct electricity. If anything touches an overhead power line, the results could be deadly. For more information, visit **nyseg.com**, click on "Usage and Safety" and then on "Dig Safely and Look Up."



REMEMBER:

- Water and electricity NEVER mix.
 Keep power tools away from water, including rain, wet ground, swimming pools, sprinklers and garden hoses.
- Have a licensed electrician add weatherproof covers and GFCIs (ground-fault circuit interrupters) to outdoor electrical outlets to protect against electrical shock.
- Leave cutting and trimming of trees near power lines to professionals. A tree or limb that comes in contact with a power line could be deadly.
