

Here are some tips to maximize your home's energy efficiency and minimize your utility bill.

- 1 Set thermostats between 65° and 70°, and at 58° when you're away from the house for more than a few hours. This may not be advisable if you have frail, ill or elderly people or infants in your home.
- 2 Turn down thermostats automatically without sacrificing comfort by installing automatic setback or programmable thermostats.
- 3 Change or clean furnace filters once a month during the heating season.
- 4 Warm air rises, so use registers to direct warm airflow across the floor.

- 5 Close vents and doors in unused rooms and close fireplace dampers when not in use
- 6 Set water heater temperatures at 120° to cut water heating bills without sacrificing comfort.
- 7 Install water-flow restrictors in showerheads and faucets
- 8 Run washing machines and clothes drvers with a full load.
- 9 Open draperies and blinds on sunny days to let the warmth in and close at night to insulate against cold air outside.




Before a Storm Strikes

- Have flashlights and a battery-operated radio handy.
- Have a working corded telephone. Cordless and digital phones may not work during a power interruption.
- Store adequate supplies of water and non-perishable food
- Unplug sensitive electronic equipment – televisions, microwave ovens. VCRs and computers - that could be damaged by lightning or power surges.
- Set freezer and refrigerator controls to their coldest setting to extend the length of time the food will keep.
- If an electric pump supplies vour water, fill bathtubs and containers for water supply.
- Know how to manually operate your garage door.
- If someone in your home depends on life-support equipment powered by electricity, call us now at 1.800.572.1111. You must provide an emergency power source during any unplanned power interruption.

If you chose **NYSEG** for your electricity supply >>

- (A) You'll see your **new** electricity supply pricing option listed here.
- (B) In 2007, some customers' basic service charges have changed. If this is the case for your service, we have split your total basic service charge into two line items; your December charge at the old rate, your January charge at the new one.
- © Your bill issuance charge reflects NYSEG's costs to produce and send bills. This is not a new charge; it was previously part of the basic service charge. Customers selecting a supplier other than NYSEG (also known as an energy services company or ESCO) whose ESCO charges appear on their NYSEG bill are not charged for bill issuance by NYSEG.
- O Your electricity charges are separated and listed by month. Your December charges reflect your electricity use at your 2006 *Voice Your Choice* supply pricing option.
- E Your January electricity charges are for your 2007 use at your new Voice Your Choice supply pricing option.
- © Customers who purchase their electricity supply from NYSEG will have a merchant function charge. This is not a new charge; it was previously part of your electricity supply charges. The merchant function charge reflects NYSEG's administrative costs to obtain electricity supply. Customers selecting a supplier other than NYSEG do not pay these charges to NYSEG.




If you chose an energy services company (ESCO) for your electricity supply >>

- (G) You'll see your **new** electricity supply pricing option listed here.
- In 2007, some customers' basic service charges have changed. If this is the case for your service, we have split your total basic service charge into two line items; your December charge at the old rate, your January charge at the new one.
- 1 Your electricity charges are separated and listed by month. Your December charges reflect your electricity use at your 2006 *Voice Your Choice* supply pricing option.
- ① Your January electricity charges are for your 2007 use at your new *Voice Your Choice* supply pricing option.

If you were enrolled in an ESCO supply option in 2006, you previously received an additional credit on your delivery charges which offset the merchant function charge. The merchant function charge now appears as a separate line item on NYSEG supply bills only. Customers who purchase their electricity supply from a supplier other than NYSEG do not pay NYSEG a merchant function charge.

If you are enrolled in the ESCO Price Option with Supply Adjustment you will receive an additional retail access credit of 1/10th of a cent per kilowatt-hour.

Customers who purchase their electricity supply from a supplier other than NYSEG and have their ESCO supply charges included on their NYSEG bill do not pay NYSEG a bill issuance charge, however the ESCO may include an ESCO billing charge in their portion of the bill.

If you did not make a supply choice by 7 p.m. on December 29, and you are a NYSEG supply customer who does not pay demand charges, your account was automatically enrolled in the NYSEG Default Supply Option. If you did not make a supply choice and you do pay demand charges, your account was automatically enrolled in the NYSEG Variable Price Option.

If you are an ESCO supply customer and your supplier did not send NYSEG a new enrollment for your account, you were placed in the ESCO supply pricing option most like your 2006 choice.

If you chose a new electricity supplier, your choice may not take effect until your February bill.



Emergency Generator Safety Guidelines

- Operate your generator outdoors in a clean, dry, well-ventilated area.
- Make sure all electrical connections comply with National Electric Code.
- NEVER connect a generator to an existing wiring system without an automatic transfer switch
- NEVER overload your generator with too many appliances.
- NEVER let children play near a generator.

Food Processing >> Upstate Farms Cooperative, Inc.

Through its economic development program, NYSEG provided a \$100,000 grant to Upstate Farms Cooperative to offset the cost of a new electric substation needed to increase production capacity and decrease costs.

The company's old plant produced about 55 million pounds of cultured dairy products per year, whereas the new facility and equipment is able to produce more than 100 million pounds.

Upstate Farms was founded in 1965 by New York dairy farmers to manufacture, market, and distribute high-quality dairy products such as milk, ice cream mix, yogurt, cottage cheese, sour cream and dip, under the Upstate Farms, Bison, Wendt's, and Intense Milks brands.

Upstate Farms employs more than 650 skilled workers in its four processing centers – three in Buffalo and one in Rochester – and its seven distribution centers throughout the Upstate New York region.
